Industrial action

You probably remember the unfortunate situation the occurred at Tufty Carpets shortly after Mr Tufty announced that Tufty Carpets had been selected to be the exclusive red carpet sponsor of the *Les Arcs Film* festival.

One of Tufty Carpets' lorry drivers had been assigned to drive a large roll of red carpet down to the festival. All of Tufty's drivers belong to the *United Road Transport Union* (*URTU*) and the *URTU*'s shop steward at Tufty, Sid Brownie, demanded a 10% pay rise for Tufty drivers, backdated to 2010. Mr Tufty was about to arrive home in a taxi after cancelling his helicopter flying lesson when his mobile phone began to ring. It was Sid Brownie. Mr Tufty's heart sank. Mr Brownie told Mr Tufty that the *URTU* and *ACWU* had been in consultations and had decided that Tufty's workers were going home immediately because of the Corona virus threat.

Mr Tufty told Mr Brownie to stay at the factory so that he could return and discuss the matter before making a hasty decision. Mr Brownie agreed and went to tell the ACWU shop steward, Barry 'Ghost' Hawkes.

A few second later Mr Tufty received another call. It was Harry Helmsworth, the chief reporter from *Independent Carpet Radio News*. He had discovered that there may be trouble at Tufty Carpets.

By now Mr Tufty was in a state of shock. The government had clearly said that essential businesses should stay open and what could be more essential than carpet manufacturing? What was the world coming to?

Mr Tufty has requested some backup from the French Management team as he seeks to negotiate to keep the Tufty Carpets factory open.

Questions:

Vocabulary

Shop steward: Someone elected by workers, for example in a factory, to represent them in dealings with management.

Lorry: (*British)* A large, heavy motor vehicle used for transporting goods

Heart sank: One's courage or hope fails; one is very disappointed or dejected.

What is the world coming to?: A rhetorical question that expresses disappointment or disillusionment

with the state of the world and its future

In a state of shock: Unpleasant or upsetting feeling because of something unexpected

In his best interests: It will benefit him.
